Anti-Bullying - Odd socks week!

At Stowmarket High School we treat people with respect and dignity in an environment where any form of discrimination, prejudice and bullying will be addressed quickly. We value the contributions that our students and members of staff make to school life including people of different genders, ages, religions, ethnicities, and those people that may have a disability. As a school we are working hard to maintain and enhance a culture that is respectful,



kind and understanding where everybody is treated with dignity and respect. To support this philosophy, we are working very closely with the anti-bullying alliance to address issues related to bullying and harassment that may arise in school and the local community.

During the course of next week, students will be taught about the effects and impact bullying has on the emotional and mental health of children and young people. Alongside this we will remind and teach students how we approach and tackle issues of discrimination and bullying.

At Stowmarket High School we define bullying as the **repetitive**, **intentional hurting** of one person or group by another person or group, where the relationship involves an **imbalance of power**. Bullying can be physical, verbal, or psychological.

If your son/daughter has been affected by bullying in any way, please reach out to the Head of Year who will support you in dealing with the concern.

In our continued communication with students, we will be asking them to:

- 1. Say something without being a bystander. We believe that students need to support each other to make sure discrimination or bullying is not left unattended.
- 2. Help someone that you know may be affected by bullying. When you see someone being bullied, let them know they aren't alone. Ask if they're ok, ask if they'd like your help with dealing with it, or simply say hi!





3. Finally, and most importantly please let an adult in school know what's going on. Tell them what you've seen or heard. We're here to help!

To support our work in addressing a culture that is free from discrimination and bullying please encourage your son / daughter to wear odd socks to school for the whole of next **week starting on Monday 13 November 2023**. Staff have been asked to use this to talk to children about bullying and its effects and the impact it has on the social, emotional and mental health of those affected.
